# THE 2017 FINANCIAL STORY A REPORT TO SPRING MEETING 2018

e are pleased to report the financial results of the operation for the year 2017. The audited financial statement indicates the blessings we received and the guidance of the Lord on our endeavors.

Twice last year we pointed to the fact that in order to reach a break-even level in our operations five variables would need to be on our side, to make the end result positive. These were:

- the US market to remain moving steadily in positive territory;
- 2) the total gross tithe reported by the North American Division in the 52 Sabbaths of 2017 would have to be better than the 53 Sabbaths in 2016;

- the exchange fluctuation of key overseas currencies would need to remain steady;
- 4) fiscal discipline holding expenditures down would be essential to the success of the 2017 fiscal exercise;
- 5) maintaining an adequate liquidity level.

I am pleased to report that all five came together, making our report today a positive one.

# THE RESULTS OF THE OPERATION FOR THE YEAR 2017

The Unrestricted and Restricted Net Assets shows an Increase to Net Asset of \$1.6 million as of December 31, 2017.




#### US FINANCIAL MARKETS

The improvement in the US financial markets in 2017 contributed to a positive result in our operations for the year.



# **TOTAL GROSS TITHE**

The total gross tithe reported by North America in the 52 Sabbaths of 2017 exceeded the 53 Sabbaths of 2016. The comprehensive view of tithe for the world field points to the fact that perhaps in these five years we may come close, or even reach 3.0 billion dollars for the first time.





The mission offering total for the year 2017 was \$83,799,453, which represents a 1.8% increase over 2016..


# **CURRENCY EXCHANGE UPDATE**

The value of critical currencies to our operation, particularly the value of the Brazilian Real against the US dollar, showed resilience throughout 2017.



## **TOTAL EXPENSES ARE DOWN**

The total amount spent in 2017 was slightly below the 2016 level. The expense in the office reached 87.55% of the cap limit. which represents an improvement over 2016. Funding of depreciation was not included in last year's budget, but provision has been made to fund depreciation for 2017 in 2018. Travel expense was 82.3% of the total budgeted travel.




# LIQUIDITY LEVEL

Liquidity ended slightly higher in 2017 than in 2016, moving from 99.42% to 101.92%.



## **REVIEW AND HERALD LAND VALUE**

The year 2017 was a good year, particularly when the revaluation of our land investment at the Review and Herald experienced a decline from \$250,000 per acre to \$100,000 value per acre. Had this matter not occurred we would have reported to you a Total Increase in Net Assets of \$8,241,740.



## **CURRENCY MANAGEMENT**

We are continuing with the comprehensive currency management initiative, and the repurposing of the headquarters building space.

# WEEKLY GIVING INCREASE

The average weekly giving of tithe and mission offerings expressed in US dollars, shows an increase in 2017 from 45 million to 49 million per week. Could it be that the stewardship emphasis we initiated is beginning to show results? Perhaps it is.




#### **OPERATING CAP REPORT**

The Operating Cap report is comprised of two major elements—the operating cap itself (2% of gross World Tithe) and GC headquarters operating expenses that must remain under this operating cap. In terms of U.S. dollars, the 2017 gross tithe increased by 7.5 percent and the operating cap increased correspondingly.

The result was that in 2017 the GC operated at USD 6.1 million below the cap limit, and USD 4.5 million under the budget, and for that we praise the Lord and thank Him. This was possible most importantly by the blessing of the Lord as evidenced by the increase in tithe from around the world. A secondary factor was the control of expenses and our decision not to fund the depreciation expense in 2017. The 2017 expenses amounted



to 87.55 percent of the cap. Last year the Executive Committee approved a cap of 2.12 percent of gross world tithe for 2017, rather than the 2 percent, and for 2018 it was approved at 2.13 percent. In this context it should be noted that the numbers in this report are expressed in terms of the standard 2 percent cap, not on the higher rate. It is a blessing from the Lord that we were able to operate without utilizing the extra portion of the cap as had been approved.



# STRATEGIC PLANNING AND BUDGETING COMMITTEE AND MISSION BOARD RECOMMENDATION

The Strategic Planning and Budgeting Committee and the Mission Board recommended an appropriation of USD 2,232,481 from the 10/40 Window fund for the project, "Hope for Kolkata." This project is a comprehensive plan for establishing 50 new congregations in the city of Kolkata, India.

Within the official city boundaries there are nearly 5 million people, and in the greater metro area, the population is about 16 million people – but to reach that area, we only have 160 members within 4 churches. It's a huge task.

Because this is a comprehensive plan, including evangelistic efforts combined with comprehensive health ministry, the overall budget is USD 5.5 million.


# **ACCOUNTABILITY FOR USE OF TITHE REPORT**

The use of tithe report has been part of policy for the last couple of years. It is a new report that is being required of all of our missions, conferences, unions, divisions, and the General Conference.


The Accountability for the Use of Tithe is in the GC Working Policy, Section V 20. Between 2016 and 2017 the numbers are quite consistent as a percentage of how tithe was used. This is not how the overall GC budget is allocated, but it is how the tithe portion of the budget is allocated.



Graphically, for 2017, you will see the various components—Headquarters operating, education, evangelism, media outreach. The biggest section is "Other." This is how the policy identifies the different categories that we report on. Of course, it is assuming a global roll-up into this "other" number.



Another way to look at it from the GC's perspective would be this graph, which shows how we have used tithe here at the General Conference. Starting with the purple section—the first two sections are appropriations to divisions and others— 22 percent of the GC tithe income. International Service Employee (ISE) funding is about 18 percent, General Conference Auditing Service (GCAS) funding is around 7 percent, Media Outreach (includes Adventist World Radio (AWR), Hope Channel, *Adventist Review* and *Adventist World*), is at 10 percent; Headquarters Operating, 28 percent; and then 15 percent for "Others."

## NAD TITHE REDUCTION

The years 2018-2020 will continue bringing the challenge of declining tithe percentages from North America. In the international scenario we have done our best to anticipate and minimize the negative currency fluctuation impact on our income. Our expected income will continue to be predicted one year at a time.

The Lord will add His blessing to us one year at a time, and we will continue doing our best to maintain adequate levels of liquidity and working capital to provide stability and efficiency to the mission of the Church.



# **CONCLUSION**

Even though this report reflects a work in process, we rejoice in presenting it to you. Please remember that the most powerful financial transaction occurs when a member gives. When a member gives, a wave of energy moves around the world.



Before I conclude my report, I wish to invoke the words of Jeremiah the prophet when he wrote, "Call to Me and I will answer you and tell you great and incomprehensible things you do not know" (Jeremiah 33:3, HCSB). And, also the words written by Moses in Exodus "The Lord will fight for you" (Ex. 14:14, HCSB). We believe He has, we believe He will. We will do our best, but the results are His, and the glory is also His.

We thank our members who gave generously in 2017, and the countless volunteers and employees that have made this report possible.

- Audited Financial Reports
  - ► The yearly audit of the General Conference was performed by an independent, outside auditing firm, Maner & Costerisan.
  - Lead auditor was Jim Nyquist who presented the audit report
  - ► The 2017 audit reports were clean, and financial statements were fairly stated.
  - ► The reports were "very positive," according to Nyquist.
  - ► The General Conference Financial Audit Committee, with Gary Thurber, chairman, and Andrea Luxton, secretary, recommended the acceptance of the combined financial statements for 2017.

- Audit Report on GC Policy Compliance
  - Maner & Costerisan rendered its report on General Conference compliance with GC Working Policy.
  - ▶ Jim Nyquist, lead auditor reported, "In connection with our audit, no material instances of non-compliance came to our attention that we believe to be in violation of relevant working policies in so far as they relate to accounting matters. A clean opinion on Working Policy, which is again very positive for an organization such as the General Conference."

  - Family Ministries celebrates its Centennial in 2019. Eight "Reaching Families for Jesus" evangelism events are being held around the world during this quinquennium.

  - ▶ The government of Brazil has

- embraced enditnow, and the program is in schools. Special magazines are produced yearly for adults and children.
- ▶ In Macedonia, women distributed 3,000 copies of *The Words of Hope*.
- On city streets in Serbia, women and girls distributed the book Heart to Heart.
- In Cyprus, women present open-air concerts and picnics in the park and invite on-lookers to church.

  - ► IRLA was chartered in 1893 and is a faith-based organization.
  - The Adventist understanding of religious freedom doesn't originate in human experience, but from God. Freedom is part of the image of God.
  - The difference between an Adventist understanding of religious freedom and a sociopolitical understanding is the difference between justice and righteousness.
  - ► This affects IRLA activities by seeking to restore not only human dignity, but the image of God in humans
  - ▶ IRLA promotes religious freedom for all people through contributions to public debate and discourse, relationship building and advocacy, events and initiatives.
  - ► The 8<sup>th</sup> IRLA World Congress was held in 2017, with 549 attendees

representing 64 countries, including public officials and faith leaders. IRLA organized a Meeting of Experts focusing on the Universality of Human Rights, held at Princeton Theological Seminary in 2017. In August 2018, the meeting will be held in Spain.

  - PARL watches legislative activity and works to encourage balance in laws that might affect religious liberty.

- Mission Advance Committee Report— Guillermo Biaggi, Geoffrey Mbwana, Mark Finley, Abner de los Santos
  - Mission Advance was formerly known as Counsel on Evangelism and Witnessing.
  - Purpose is to encourage new, innovative, creative ways to reach 7.6 billion people.
  - The Spirit of Prophecy (SOP) has much counsel on this topic. For example:
    - O Youth can be involved (ED271).
    - Combine medical missionary work and ministry of the Word (6T 300).
    - OMinisters gain interests by first giving health talks (TE 245).
    - Reading literature prepares way for spoken word (PM 398).
    - Ouplifting humanity begins in the home (MH 349).
    - O Different methods from the past to be used (7T 25).
    - Cry out to God for His wisdom (GW 38).
    - A variety of methods are essential (TM 251, EV 106, GW 468).
    - Ouse reason and good judgement (GW 468)
  - Geoffrey Mbwana emphasized that workers need not be ashamed who correctly handle the word of truth (2 Tim. 2:15), and any method used should not dilute the message as is given in the Bible and SOP.
  - Mark Finley shared how two young adults helped him reach into new territory using social media for ministry, including YouTube and Facebook.
  - YouTube and Facebook are very cost effective in reaching target audiences and building relationships in communities (particularly with young adults). One of every two people in the U.S. log onto Facebook every day. Worldwide, 2 billion people log onto Facebook every month.
  - Pastors are encouraged to expand their ministries by using these tools, including building email lists. Innovative young adult church planter in the Philippines, Reylourd Ray, uses the online service "Meetup" to reach out to

- young professionals in Manila. Approximately 50 percent of those reached are unchurched. Starting in 2012, this ministry has since grown into four church plants in Manila. Visit: http://bbit.ly/GROWCommunityPH.

Serving approximately 100,000 people in the camp, these volunteers provide the only health and medical services available. The camp is one of several places that Adventist Help has served since it was established in 2015 in response to the refugee crisis developing in the Middle East and Europe.

# REPORT FROM THE UNITY OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE

After several months of dialogue and gathering data, the Unity Oversight Committee has begun outlining elements of a compliance process that will be considered at this year's Annual Council. The Committee, which met May 14 at the world headquarters in Silver Spring, Maryland, had a positive and productive time together and is moving toward consensus on the basic elements of the document that will go to Annual Council in October, said Mike Ryan, who chairs the group.

The committee is part of the "Unity in Mission: Procedures in Church Reconciliation" process voted at the 2016 Annual Council

During its May 14 meeting, the committee discussed the first steps in drafting an outline of a document to be brought to the 2018 Annual Council.

"Consensus is forming around a few points to be included in the outline," Ryan said, "although it is still under development." He also pointed out that "the dialogues with the world divisions and various unions have been very helpful and have guided the writing committee in its outline."

By the end of May, members of the committee will have met with the leaders of 12 of the 14 world church entities (13 divisions and one attached union), according to Hensley Moorooven, secretary of the Unity Oversight Committee.

"These have been very cordial and candid dialogues," Moorooven said.

Meetings with the remaining two entities are scheduled to take place in the next few weeks, and according to Moorooven, the work of the committee will be informed by the input received, indicating their input will be considered before the document is finalized.

Ryan emphasized the document is still in its outline stage and "between now and August we will be in the development process."

The document will be released in its entirety once it is considered and voted by the GC Administrative Committee (ADCOM). From there it will be sent to the General Conference and Division Officers (GCDO) Committee before going to the GC Executive Committee at Annual Council this October.
