Rationale

The Alive in Jesus Sabbath School Curriculum is a Bible curriculum developed by the Sabbath School and Personal Ministries Department of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. It seeks to nurture the spiritual life of our children and youth from the time they are babies until they are 18 years of age. We are given the advice to "train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it" (Proverbs 22:6). Such training is no small task. Alive in Jesus seeks to equip and empower parents, caregivers, Sabbath School teachers, Sabbath School leaders, and others to model and foster a thriving relationship with Jesus and the children in their spheres of influence.

Jesus reaches out His hand to children and adults everywhere, and says, "I have come that they may have life, and that they may have it more abundantly" (John 10:10). The goal of the Alive in Jesus Sabbath School Curriculum is to make disciples who make disciples—to encourage young people around the globe to hold on to Jesus' hand that will never let them go, to **know** truth as revealed in His Word and **grow** daily in their relationship with Him, to stand tall and worship the Creator alone in these last days, and to **go** and share this with others to make a difference for eternity.

By incorporating what is known about the stages of faith development and the important role of parents and caregivers in nurturing faith, best educational practice meets Bible narrative and truth, in order to grow faith and impart a clear Seventh-day Adventist worldview through the teaching and learning in this seamless 18-year scope.

Foundation: The Bible

ust as the Bible becomes central to our lives when we abide in Jesus, so God's Word also forms the heart of the Alive in Jesus Curriculum. It is both the bedrock and the vehicle for achieving desired outcomes. In order to be alive in Christ, Jesus invites us to abide in His Word (see John 8:31; 15:7). When we choose Him, we trust Him, seek Him, and keep His Word as the central guiding principle of our lives (see 1 John 2:5). This Word is living, powerful, and sweet to our souls (see Hebrews 4:12; 1 Peter 1:23; Psalm 119:103).

The Alive in Jesus Curriculum introduces children and youth to Jesus by bringing the wonderful stories and lessons of the Bible (including a clear Seventh-day Adventist worldview and the 28 fundamental beliefs) into our lives. This curriculum shows young people that the truths of the Bible are unchanging and trustworthy, equipping them to study the Bible meaningfully for themselves in order to ultimately share the timeless truths of the Bible with others.

The central purpose of using the Bible in such an intentional way in the Alive in Jesus Curriculum is to draw children and young people into a growing relationship with Jesus, the Giver of the Word, that will last forever.

Pillars

1. GRACE

We are first made alive in Jesus by the gift and power of His grace, which flows from His heart of mercy and love (see Ephesians 2:4, 5). When we live in an abiding relationship with Jesus, we receive this grace and accept His love for us (see John 15:9). Such gracious love for the most unworthy of sinners has power to captivate the heart and create new spiritual life in the soul.

The Alive in Jesus Sabbath School Curriculum shows children and young people that Jesus loves them personally and that He offers grace and salvation to every person. This incredible gift is free, unmerited, and hard to comprehend. Yet when we accept it, it changes us and compels us to respond to God in love and obedience.

Alive in Jesus seeks to embrace, challenge, and strengthen children and youth in their personal walk with Him. It teaches Bible truth in a redemptive way, without assuming that all have chosen Jesus; while at the same time, not avoiding difficult questions.

2. CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT

When we live in an abiding relationship with Jesus and experience His grace, we allow Him to "prune" us when we need it (John 15:2), to bring about fruit (see verse 4) for His glory.

The Alive in Jesus Sabbath School Curriculum seeks to show all children that they are valued, loved, and accepted, while also showcasing the "fruit," or Christlike character, that grows and develops in our hearts as we abide in Him. The fruit that results from a living connection with the Savior leads to transformation in our lives, homes, and communities.

3. MISSION

When we are alive in Christ, we long for others to experience the same joy of salvation that we have received (see John 15:11; Psalm 51:12, 13).

Alive in Jesus seeks to foster a trusting, joy-filled, lifelong walk with Jesus that cannot be contained! It seeks to nurture children to become passionate in sharing the gospel and soon-coming Savior with others. Ellen White reminds us, "It is in service that our greatest joy and our highest education will be found." It's also in witnessing that our faith is strengthened, in response to sharing the gospel with the world. Ultimately, this Curriculum seeks to train our young people to be active agents in the mission of the church.

t's no small task to create a curriculum for a global audience with many varied needs and contexts. We are committed to the representation and inclusion of all people and have several rigorous oversight processes in place to achieve this. All lessons are sent through a paid review process by a range of specialists from around the world, and all receive input from the Biblical Research Institute. In addition to this, lower-level and upper-level steering committees give guidance to the development of the Alive in Jesus Curriculum. These committees have global representation from Children's Ministries Division directors, Youth directors, curriculum specialists, educators/teachers, and parents, along with a few from the General Conference (GC) Sabbath School and Personal Ministries (SSPM) Department.

GLOBAL PILOT

In January 2023 a global pilot was conducted of four of the seven levels of this new curriculum: Beginner, Kindergarten, Primary, and Junior. All divisions were invited to be part of this pilot. Globally, 55 churches in 15 regions participated, in 18 languages. Churches were provided with full sets of student and teacher guides and all associated resources. Feedback from this global readership at the grassroots level has helped refine the curriculum.

More than 826 total responses were received to the post-pilot survey. More than 95% of the respondents indicated they found the new curriculum to be good, great, or excellent. The positive feedback indicates that the goals of Alive in Jesus are being met. As a result of the feedback, small changes were made to strengthen the lessons.







BIBLE STORIES

Every day, the Bible story can be read to the Beginner child. Notice the italicized actions for parents to do while they read the story. Parents can also engage the child by asking them to point to different parts of the picture before they turn the page. The bright, realistic pictures communicate that these Bible stories are true.



MEMORABLE PLAY



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Pigs grunted, parrots whistled, and hyenas squealed. Noah and his family of just eight people must have laughed as they looked around the ark. This was their new home. What a noisy, smelly . . . amazing place!

Outside the ark, the people stared at the boat. They had watched all the animals walk into the ark. They saw the big open door. But they chose not to come into the boat. God longed to save everyone, but He wouldn't force those who didn't want to be saved.

Suddenly the big, heavy door swung s-l-o-w-l-y shut. The Bible says, "Then the Lord closed the door behind them" (Genesis 7:16, ICB).

God closed the door, and only He could open it.

That evening the stars twinkled against the still night sky. When morning came, the sun rose, as usual, in the clear blue sky. For seven days everything in nature stayed exactly the same.

The people outside looked up at the blue sky. *Noah must be wrong*, they thought. *It wasn't going to rain!* They banged loudly on the thick sides of the boat and made fun of Noah and his family.

Parent Faith Talk

Share a time with your child that you needed to trust God's promise "I will never leave you nor forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5b).

Inside the ark Noah and his family calmly waited. Why weren't they worried that the rain hadn't come? What had God said to Noah? Read **Genesis 7:4**.

More Waiting and Trusting

For 40 long days it rained and rained. Then the wind died down and the rain stopped. All was quiet and still. The ark now rocked gently while monkeys chattered, rabbits snuffled, and lions purred.

Outside the ark, water covered everything! The Bible tells us, "The water rose so much that even the highest mountains under the sky were covered by it" (Genesis 7:19, ICB).

Noah and his family were safe in the floating zoo. But still they must wait and trust the God who had saved them.

After 150 days, with a whoosh and a whirl, "God made a wind blow over the earth. And the water went down" (Genesis 8:1, ICB). Finally the floating boat went *bump*! It had come to a sudden stop. Where had the ark landed? Read **Genesis 8:4**.

No more floating; no more rocking! They were on dry land at last. Noah and his family were so excited! But still the door stayed shut.

One day, after waiting and waiting, Noah opened the window. He gently lifted a raven, and later a dove, into the sky. The birds flew off with a flutter and a flap. *Would they find a new home?* No, they both came back to the ark. There was still too much water around.

After a week Noah sent out the dove again. This time it came back with a treasure: "A fresh olive leaf was in its mouth" (Genesis 8:11, ICB). The waters were going down. Plants were growing again. Their time on the boat was nearly over!

Noah and his family smiled excitedly as they stepped off the boat and wiggled their toes in the fresh new grass. They pointed and laughed as they watched the horses prancing, lions wrestling, and foxes chasing each other's fluffy tails.

There was so much to do in this clean earth to make it their home! What did Noah do first? Read **Genesis 8:20**.

Noah collected big, heavy rocks from the ground and stacked them on top of each other to build an altar. He and his family wanted to say a big thank-You to God, so they offered a sacrifice.

Beside the altar, Noah and His family gave thanks to God. God had watched over them and saved them. God promises, "I will never leave you nor forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5b). Thank You, God.



RAIN, RAIN, AND MORE RAIN

Safe inside the ark, Noah and his little family got used to their floating home tossing around and the steady rhythm of the pounding rain. It had rained for so long... How long did it rain? **PEAD GENESIS 7:12.**

Inside their floating home they were dry and protected. God had kept them safe by designing the ark to float perfectly in raging waters. It had a roof that the water ran off, thick walls, and a tightly closed door. The ark had no big windows, so they were kept from seeing the loss of their neighbors and their old home. God lovingly protected them and saved them from the

flood. In the same way He will someday save us from this evil world when we choose Jesus and the safety He offers us.

Noah and his family may have counted the days and nights eagerly. 1, 2, ... 38, 39, 40!

After 40 days God stopped the rain! In its place He sent howling winds to help dry up the water.

Then God guided the tossing ark into peaceful waters inside a group of mountains. Noah and his family were grateful that their home had stopped tossing and rolling; they surely wouldn't miss that!

How might you have felt in the ark during the storm?

 What would have helped you feel safe? Read Psalm 34:7.

PRAY: Thank God that He protects us when things get scary.


Do: Share your memory verse (say, write, sing) with someone who might not know God well.

loating safely on the water, Noah and his family continued to care for all the animals. Can you imagine sharing a giant home with all those beautiful, licky, slimy, spiky, fluffy, squawky, growly animals? Which animals would you have loved to care for each day? The family faithfully looked after them all. They threw grain to the birds, cabbages to the hippos, and bananas to the moneys. They swept out the lions' area and shoveled out elephant poo. Some jobs were fun, and others weren't, but they faithfully did them all.

Throughout their busy days they waited and wondered... How long would it be until they could leave the ark? Weeks and months went by. Sometimes they must have felt tired of waiting. But they trusted God, for they knew He had a lot of water to dry up! How long did the water cover the earth for? **PEAD GENESIS** 7:24.

That many days equals five long months. It was a good thing they had work to do and animals to love while they waited.

Then one day Noah released a raven. It circled back and forth but couldn't land because there were still tons of water everywhere. Then seven days later he let a white dove fly eagerly away. It flapped around, and then returned, a sign that it had nowhere to land. After seven more days of patient waiting, Noah let the dove go again. This time it returned with an olive leaf in its beak—there was dry land and growing plants somewhere out there! Then one week later it soared away and didn't return—it had found a new home.

This was happy news for Noah's family! The happy eight continued waiting, knowing that they too would soon leave the ark.

WAITING, WAITING, WAITING

he little white dove had found a place outside the ark to make a home. Noah wondered . . . If the dove was safe, what did the world look like now? Noah just had to find out! So he "removed the covering of the ark and looked, and indeed the surface of the ground was dry" (Genesis 8:13).

Imagine Noah's delight! His eyes feasted on blue sky and mountain peaks. His family crowded around, needing to see the dry land and blue sky too. Excitement rippled through the ark. Soon they would all be free!

But "soon" was not "now," so they patiently waited. God had shut the ark's door, and God was the one who would let them out. Their job was to patiently wait. What promise does God give to those who wait for Him? Read or recite [SAIAH 40:31.

We can be sure that Noah and his little family were blessed in all these ways because they waited patiently for God to let them out. God was allowing the land to dry out enough so that plants could grow, food could be gathered, and the family could survive outside the ark. By waiting, they were trusting God to protect them.

Then one day it happened. The big, heavy door creaked slowly open. What excitement! Eight happy people leaped to their feet and let the animals free. Running and hopping, flying and crawling, the restless animals surged out the

THANK YOU, GOD

At last eight happy people left the ark! With grateful smiles and a spring in their step, they stood upon dry ground. Then they immediately set about doing the most important thing. It wasn't building a house, or cooking their dinner, or exploring what was over the hill. No, it was much more important than that. What did Noah do first when he got out of the ark? **PEAD GENESIS 8:20.**

Noah and his family had so much to thank God for, and they wanted to do it in the way He had asked His people to, just as Abel had done. When an altar was built and the animals placed there, the little family gathered round. Kneeling together in a quiet huddle, they began to worship God. Grateful praise rose from their hearts and their lips as they thanked God for protecting them, saving them, and loving them through the roughest seas and the wildest storm.

God accepted the gift of their praise and thanks. He loved His faithful children, and He was happy they loved Him right back with their grateful hearts.

THINK ... THEN TALK ABOUT IT

- What would you have thanked God for if you had just left the ark?
- What do your family members do for you? Why not thank them right now!

God loves it when we worship Him with thankful hearts. Just as Noah worshipped God first when he left the ark, our prayers can begin with thanks for God's blessings.







PFAY: Kneel down as Noah and his little family did beside the altar. Thank God for His blessings in your life, and that He gives us loving instructions.

GO: For a nature walk and look for proof of two things: the beauty of God's creation, and ways that sin has damaged or changed that beauty. Thank God that we can still see beautiful things.

DO; Good will always exist alongside the bad in our world. Write, draw, or act out **opposites** for these words, and ask your family to guess what they are: hate, sadness, darkness, doubt, war, loneliness, fear.

A CHANGED WORLD

Rising up from their reverent worship, Noah and his family now took the time to take a good look around. Shocked by what they saw, they sadly shook their heads. Gone was the beautiful world they had known before the Flood. In its place was a rough and barren landscape.

The raging waters had left the mountains jagged and bare and the land scattered with tree trunks that had snapped like matchsticks. Beautiful precious metals such as gold and silver were now buried deep under rocks and dirt. They would never sparkle on the surface of the earth again, as they had done in many places before.

Gazing at the ugliness surrounding them, their sad hearts now understood more of the far-reaching results of wickedness. First it had infected people's hearts, and now it left scars on their world.

God saw their sadness and He understood, for He must have felt it too. Washing the world clean of wickedness was a very loving thing to do; but even good things sometimes come with sadness. Not wanting them to sit with their sorrow, God did something special. What did God do? **PEN GENERA 9.1.**

What a wonderful thing God did! God's blessing meant they had peace, joy, and a new start—because they had been faithful to Him. Noah knew what to do. With God's blessing upon them, they needed to have families of precious children, just as God had said. They needed to begin building meaningful lives in their changed world. It wouldn't be easy, but if they waited upon the Lord, He would renew their strength (Isaiah 40:31).

THINK ... THEN TALK ABOUT IT

• God did not leave Noah and his family alone. He even blessed Noah and his family. How does God bless you and your family?

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A RAINBOW AND A PROMISE

God's heart was bursting with His plan to share something very special with Noah and his family! It was a beautiful thing they had never seen before, and He knew how much they would love it. What was the special thing God shared? **PEN GENERS 9.13.**

What an awesome way for God to speak love to His children! The sudden burst of color blazed in a big arch across the sky. They gazed up at it in awe. It was the first rainbow this world had ever seen.

But even more beautiful than the rainbow was the message of love it gave. It was God's way of telling them that He would never flood the whole earth again—ever! Every time the half circle of beautiful colors shone across the sky, it would remind them that God keeps His promises to love and care for His children. It was a lovely comfort to God's eight faithful people after the Flood had changed their world so much. Why did God send a rainbow as a reminder of His promise? PEAD REVELATION 4:2,3,

God was sending a very special little piece of heaven to earth and sharing it with His children. Close your eyes and imagine that beautiful rainbow around God's throne. Describe it. Won't it be awesome to be there and see it one day!

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

Each week the program will follow the same sequence.

WELCOME AND SENSORY TIME (5 TO 8 MINUTES)

- Warmly welcome each individual child and parent/caregiver.
- · Guide children to the sensory play areas
- · Acknowledge and intentionally connect with parents/caregivers.
- · Learn all names of family members.
- Foster a warm welcoming atmosphere (background music).
- Display question for parents/caregivers to discuss about the quarterly theme, as possible.
- Invite parents/caregivers to share prayer needs and pray together, for each other, and for the children.

PRAISE TIME (15 MINUTES)

Invite parents/caregivers to sit on the floor with their child (where possible) or behind their child's chair so that they can contribute to their child's Sabbath School time. Have props easily on hand to be able to transition through the songs to keep the children's attention. These songs and props for each child will form the majority of the program. As you transition

These songs and props for each child will form the majority of the program. As you transition between songs, be sure to focus on the quarterly theme: I can trust God. Sing these songs together, encouraging parents/caregivers to sing with you:

- "Good Morning to You." Welcome children and parents by smiling and shaking hands.
 Today's story is a very exciting one! God asked Noah to build a big boat, an ark, for all the animals and the people who loved God to go inside.
- "Noah Took a Hammer." Use pretend hammers and saws to help cut down trees and build the ark. Show the children an ark (on the mural or an "ark" box you have created).
- "How Does My Garden Grow?" (Worms, bees, rain, sun.) Tell the children that God makes our garden grow by giving our gardens worms, bees, rain, and sunshine. As you sing, give the children props for each verse.
- "God Will Make Them Grow." (Carrots, apples.) Place a cover over a planter box with
 toy/felt carrots in it. Pretend to put seeds into "soil." Invite children to pour empty water
 cans over the garden, then take off the cover. Invite the children to "pick" the carrots.
 They may also "pick" paper apples from a plant/tree.
- "Better Together." Invite the children to place their "carrots" and "apples" into a basket
 or container. Talk about how it's good to help mommy and daddy. All the food was
 ready inside the ark. The animals then came out of the woods. Angels led them into the
- "Into Noah's Ark." As you sing each verse, give the children the following props (toy
 animals): bird, dog, cat, sheep, chicken. Invite the children to "walk" these animals into
 your ark. God would keep the animals safe. They had food and Noah's family to care for
 them. Noah asked everyone to come into the ark, but only Noah's family came.
- "The Big Door." The ark was very big, and the door was so heavy that no one, other than
 an angel, could shut it. Noah and his family waited in the ark for 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 days
 (hold up fingers to count). And then it started to rain!
- "The Raindrops Fall." Give each child an umbrella as you spray water gently around the
 room. Tell the children that the rain came down and the waters came up, up, up, and
 Noah, his family, and the animals were safe in the ark.

Explain that after it stopped raining, the waters went down. God let the ark rest on a mountain, and one day He opened the door. All the animals ran out! Then, when Noah said "Thank You" to God for keeping them safe, God sent a beautiful rainbow and promised never to flood the earth again.

A Quiet Moment . . .

Dear Sabbath School Teacher,

Can you imagine the trauma of riding inside a rocking, tipping, tossing ark day in and day out for five months? Even though it would have been challenging for Noah and his family, it was the only place to be, the safest place to be, for God was there. This was His offered haven of safety.

Noah and his family endured with God by their side. They faced the discomfort with God by their side. God saw them through.

Then God hung a rainbow in the sky—a token of love in the new world. "What compassion for erring man, to place the beautiful, variegated rainbow in the clouds, a token of the covenant of the great God with man!

... This symbol in the clouds was to confirm the belief of

all, and establish their confidence in God; for it was a token of divine mercy and goodness to man" (Ellen, G. White, The Spirit of Prophecy, vol. 1, pp. 77, 78).

Noah was saved, and his family had been spared. God's love was so vivid, so tangible, Noah could see it in living color in the sky, His heart bubbled over with gratitude. Before doing anything else, Noah built an altar to the Lord.

As you share this incredible story with the children this week, may they know and feel that God is always with them. When we know God is with us, we can endure difficulties that come our way. When we know God is with us, gratitude and praise can be on our lips.

Tips for Telling Bible Stories in Sabbath School



"Teach me what I do not see" (Job 34:32).

1. Practice telling the Bible story as you would any other story. We want to show children that the Bible is living, powerful, Irue, and trustworthy, and that God has a special message for them personally in each story, Invest time into how you will communicate this most effectively to the children in your class. Remember:

- Learn the story and be so familiar with it that you can recall the different parts. Don't read it. Memorize an outline, select appropriate visuals according to the age of your audience.
- Change the pitch, tone, and speed as the action unfolds. Use action, enthusiasm, and appropriate actives.
- gestures.

 Plan your opening sentence to catch the immediate attention of the children.

 Tell the events in a logical sequence. Don't tell
- Tell the events in a logical sequence. Don't tell unnecessary details (this will confuse and interrupt the story). The younger the audience, the fewer details are needed.
- Finish the story at the peak of interest. Don't speak too quickly, sermonize, summarize, or retell the story children don't need this.
- Tell the entire Bible story each Sabbath. Some children won't have read the lesson at home, and this might be the only opportunity for them to hear the story and learn its message.
- 3. Sabbath School should be a joyful, memorable place, where children learn about God and grow to love Him.

We should prayerfully consider how to communicate God's sacred stories in clear, meaningful ways. Children should know that the Bible stories are true—not fables. Both the method and the message of communication should clearly support this idea. Role-playing can detract, create jealousy, and focus on performance rather than the Bible story.

4. Bring the Bible story alive by one or more of the following ways:

• Peg people and props. If possible, purchase some wooden pegs and paint or decorate them as wooden people to be used in some storytelling sections. Over time, you may like to add new people: Jesus, disciples, and other Bible characters. Encourage children to retell the Bible story to each other using these peg people. You may also like to display these in a regular place with other objects (animals, house, ocean using colored materials or simple boxes) for children to play with it they arrive early. Move these peg people and objects around on your fabric scene as you tell the story. Children can take turns doing this as you tell the story, and they can then retell the story in their own words. This is an effective method to teach children to recall, internalize, and share the story with someone else.

- Use the weekly <u>Program PowerPoint</u> as you tell the story. Pause to reference the emotions on the faces of the Bible characters, the backgrounds, and the details of the story. These pictures will stay in the minds of the children and help them to remember the story.
- children and help them to remember the story.

 Felts (younger children). Although felts are an older resource, they're helpful because you can unpack the story as it happens with visuals that will stay in the minds of children. Practice with your felts ahead of time so that you can be clear about the sequence and position of each one.
- Dramatic storytelling with objects. Use expression and various objects, sounds, and smells that use our five senses to make the story memorable and clear.



DISCUSS: Hold a **rainbow stick** and share how the color **yellow** makes you feel happy because God shows in today's story that He is always with us, even in an ark bobbing around on a tossing sea. (Wiggle your "ark bottle.")

SHARE: Invite the children to stand up and repeat the Big Idea after you; God is loving. He is always with me.

TELL THE STORY (10 MINUTES)

(S) SHARE: Pray, asking God to help the children understand today's story. Then share the story "A Rainbow Promise" in an interactive and engaging way using the storytelling suggestions and Program PowerPoint.



HEAD

The Bible story is at the center of the teaching program. It is primarily teacher-directed as truths from the Bible story are shared in a meaningful, engaging way.

DETAILED PROGRAM

The full program explains in more detail the specific songs, activities, questions, crafts, mission stories, nature lessons, and the culture of the Sabbath School room that supports teachers as they lead children to know and love Jesus.

Practice saying this phrase enthusiastically with the children. They will say it in response to your question after they have mimed each of the activities below

1. "The animals are hungry!" (Mime feeding animals.)

Teacher: "Was God with Noah and his family when they fed the animals?"

Children: "Yes, God was always with them!"

2. "The wind's getting stronger!" (Wave arms side to side.)

Teacher: "Was God with them when the wind was getting stronger?"

Children: "Yes, God was always with them!"

3. "The rain's falling harder!" (Slap hands on thighs.)

Teacher: "Was God with them when the rain was falling harder?"

Children: "Yes, God was always with them!" 4. "We can leave the ark!" (Mime excitement.)

Teacher: "Was God with them when they stepped onto dry land?"

Children: "Yes, God was always with them!"

Teaching Point: God was with Noah and his family in the ark on the stormy sea, when they came out of the ark, and when they saw His beautiful rainbow promise in the sky. God will always be with us too!

Invite the children to wave their rainbow sticks as they repeat the Big Idea: God is loving. He is always with me.

NATURE/MISSION (3 MINUTES)

NATURE LESSON and NATURE COLLECTOR CARD: Share the Nature Lesson: "Better Together." Give each child Nature Card 8: Emperor Shrimp to place in their Nature Collector Bag.

CRAFT (15 MINUTES)

CRAFT: Create the Craft Activity: Rainbow Pop-up. Talk about God's special promise to Noah and review the memory verse again as you do this

🔘 REVIEW: God sent a rainbow to remind Noah's family of His promise. Noah thanked God for the colorful rainbow. The colors in the rainbow can remind us to say "Thank You" to God too

- As you think about our story today, what would you like to thank God for? (Always being with us, helping us to wait patiently, for always keeping His promises.)
- Encourage the children to either give their craft away or use it to tell someone new the story of Noah. Repeat the Big Idea: God is loving. He is always with me.

Tell the Story A Rainbow Promise

Big Idea: God is loving. He is always with me.

As you prepare to share this story, please read the student guide for the full, detailed narrative. Include additional props as needed, depending on what you have available. To maximize engagement, avoid reading the story to the children. See the storytelling suggestions at the front of this publication.

Storytelling Suggestions

- Use a carboard box "ark" with a flap door that you have precut, ready for toy animals to go inside.
 Children make animal sounds as they "walk" toy animals onto the "ark."
- Use **puppets**, **toy birds**, **or birds on craft sticks** (one black, one white) for the raven and dove.
- Have a branch for the white bird to bring back to Noah.
 Children hold the edges of blue fabric and create a "stormy sea" with the "ark bottle" in the center.
- Place green fabric down as land appears.
- · Children use flat rocks or blocks to make an altar with you.
- Children wave their rainbow sticks.
- Show the ▶ pictures from the student guide as you tell the story (week 8 Program PowerPoint).
- Use a felt set, if available, and expressive tones and actions to engage the children's interest.

Pray: Before you begin, pray. Ask God to help everyone understand today's Bible story. By doing this, you will model how important it is to pray to invite God to teach us from His living Word before we read the Bible.

TELL THE STORY: QUICK CUES



Big Idea: We are God's special creation, made in His image

EARLY ARRIVALS (10 MINUTES BEFORE SABBATH SCHOOL BEGINS)

LISTEN: Play the song "When God Speaks" or another worship song of your choice quietly in the background.

CONNECT: Take time to talk to each child individually as they arrive. Let them know that you care about them and that you are glad they have come

DO: Invite children to pair up to create face profiles. One child can lie down on their side while another traces around their head with a pencil. Then swap,

OPENING ACTIVITIES (10 MINUTES)

WELCOME: Bring the children together and welcome them as a group. Show some profiles from early arrivals and ask them to guess which profile belongs to each person.

SING: Sing "God Is Our Creator." Ask the children if they have anything special they would like the group to pray about. Sing the prayer song, "Be Still, Be Quiet."

PRAY: Invite several children to pray, remembering to pray for the special requests.

BIBLE FOCUS: Sing "The Books of the Bible" song while referring to the list of the books in order. Tell the children that if they'd like to, they can also listen to this song at home.

Share a Bible Fast Fact: There are 66 books of the Bible. The Old Testament has 39 books, and the New Testament has

GIVE: Have a child collect the offering as you all sing "Thank You, Jesus." Later, after the money has been counted by an adult, invite a child to color the next section of your Offering Chart to show how much has been collected this quarter. Then share this week's **Mission Fast Fact** about this quarter's mission project. Say a short prayer for God to bless and take the offering to where it's most needed.

SING: Warmly welcome any visitor and sing the "Visitor Song." Sing "Happy Birthday" to a child who has had a birthday this week, and pray for God to bless them.

🕠 DO: Distribute a magnifying glass to each child and give them several minutes to explore the details in the nature objects on your Nature Table. Encourage them to notice the closeup texture, color, shape, patterns, etc. in each natural object.


